Never underestimate the element of surprise for creating a highly personal environment. When money is tight, imagination is the best budget stretcher of all.

Keep it simple

Brimming with cottage charm, this room is a textbook case of mind-overmoney design. Here's what it teaches:

- Splash on bright colors. A red, white, and green palette enlivens the milieu. The walls, once dowdy in earth tones, are spunky in wake-it-up white.
- Limit the use of pattern. A single pattern—the lifesize peonies on the pillows—looks as fresh as the real thing.
- Remove heavy fabric. Privacy isn't an issue here, but letting light in is.

Don't replace it, renew it
